Customized courses for software developers

Customised, free courses for engineers and developers will ensure the supply of software experts in industry, thereby increasing competitiveness for both companies and individuals.

Software is a business-critical resource for large parts of Swedish private enterprise and an important source of innovation and competitiveness. For several of our traditional industries software is of crucial importance. PROMPT is a unique national educational initiative in cooperation with several academic parties and a number of leading Swedish industrial companies and organisations. The goal is to guarantee the supply of advanced software competencies and innovativeness in Swedish industry.

The PROMPT initiative is offering university courses on advanced level, directed towards professionals in industry. The courses are largely web-based and can be followed independent of time and room. The courses are given at a pace of 25% (7,5 credits over a full semester), and are tailored to fit in combination with work. They result in university credits and are free of charge for both the student and the company.

Courses starting in September 2016:

- Agile and Lean, 7.5 credits
- Continuous requirements engineering and product management, 7.5 credits
- Distributed Development and Outsourcing, 2.5 credits
- Functional Safety, 5 credits
- Project course in Software Development for industry, 7,5 credits
- Regression test selection and software fault prediction, 2.5 credits
- Theory of Science and Research methods, 5 credits
- Usability and User experience 7,5 credits
